

Present Simple With Other Verbs - Explanation

When to Use the Present Simple (Other Verbs)

- General truths/facts: Water boils at 100°C.
- Habits/routines: They play tennis every Sunday.
- Permanent or long-term situations: I live in London.
- Scheduled or timetabled events: The train leaves at 9 AM every morning.
 Examples:
 - I walk to school every day.
 - You study English in the evenings.
 - **He** watches TV after dinner.
 - She goes to the gym on weekends.
 - We travel abroad every summer.
 - They start work at 9 AM.

Spelling Differences in the Third Person Singular

When using **he**, **she**, or **it**, the verb in the Present Simple often changes spelling:

- 1. Add -s to most verbs:
 - o He plays football.
 - She eats breakfast at 7 AM.
- 2. Add -es to verbs ending in -ch, -sh, -ss, -x, or -o:
 - He watches TV every night.
 - She goes to school.
 - o It finishes at 5 PM.
- 3. Change -y to -ies when the verb ends in a consonant + "y":
 - \circ He **tr**ies hard. (try \rightarrow tries)
 - She studies biology. (study → studies)
- 4. Have → has:
 - o He has a new car.
 - She has two brothers.

Summary

Prono un	Normally (Add -s)	Finishing in "s, sh, ch, x, z, o" (Add -es)	Finishing in Consonant + y (Drop the -y and add -ies)	The verb "Have" (Change to "has")
I You We They	Play	Watch	Study	Have
He She It	Plays	Watch es	Stud ies	Has

Examples:

- 1. He **kisses** his mother before going to school.
- 2. She **fixes** the computer easily.
- 3. He **carries** heavy boxes to the attic.
- 4. My cat goes outside every morning.
- 5. She has two dogs and a cat.

Negative Form: "Don't / Doesn't"

- Structure: Subject + do/does + not + base form
 - I/You/We/They → don't
 - I don't eat meat.
 - We don't travel in winter.
 - He/She/It → doesn't
 - He doesn't watch TV in the morning.
 - She doesn't have a smartphone.

Fill in the blanks with don't/doesn't + base form of the verb.

Questions and Short Answers

- 1. Yes/No Questions
 - o Do + subject + base form?
 - Do you speak English?
 - Short Answers: Yes, I do. / No, I don't.
 - Does + subject + base form?
 - Does he work here?
 - Short Answers: Yes, he does. / No, he doesn't.

2. Wh- Questions

- Wh- word + do/does + subject + base form?
 - Where do they live? → They live in Canada.
 - What does she do after work? → She usually goes jogging.

Use the Present Simple for these typical, routine, factual, or scheduled actions. Remember to use -s / -es / -ies / has in the third person singular forms and do/does (and their negatives don't/doesn't) for questions and negative statements.
